opioids and heroin).






Nearly half of all opioid overdose deaths involve a prescription opioid.

IN MISSISSIPPI:



In 2018, there were enough dosage units of opioids dispensed for every man, woman, and child in Mississippi to have 50 dosage units, ranking Mississippi 5th in the nation for per capita annual opioid prescriptions.



PREVENT OPIOID ADDICTION

WHAT CAN I DO?

- **Take charge of your health.** Educate yourself on opioids and the potential dangers of misuse.
- Talk to your healthcare provider about alternative pain management options.
- Discuss the dangers of opioid misuse with your family, especially children and young adults.
- **Practice safe storage** and dispose of unused prescription medication properly.

RECOGNIZING AN OPIOID OVERDOSE

Learning the warning signs of overdose could save lives. However, it may be difficult to spot the symptoms.

SIGNS MAY INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING:

- · Small, constricted "pinpoint pupils"
- · Falling asleep or loss of consciousness
- · Slow, shallow breathing
- Choking or gurgling sounds
- Limp body
- · Pale, blue, or cold skin



CALL 911 IMMEDIATELY IF YOU SUSPECT AN OVERDOSE.

Mississippi's Good Samaritan Law protects people from arrest when calling EMS for opioid overdose cases. Also, Naloxone, a medication that blocks or reverses the effects of opioids, is now available through local pharmacies without a prescription.
